1 tsp. vanilla	
2 tbsp. white vinegar

1 cup luke warm water

**BUTTERSCOTCH CHOCOLATE OATMEAL SQUARES**

1 cup (250 mL) butter, softened, divided	1 can sweetened condensed milk
2 cups (500 mL) packed brown sugar	1 package (300 g) butterscotch chips
2 eggs	1 cup (250 mL) semi-sweet chocolate chips
2 tsp (10 mL) vanilla	1 ¼ cups (300 mL) sliced almonds, divided
2 ½ cups flour (625 mL)	
1 tsp. (5mL) baking soda	
3 cups (750 mL) quick cooking oats	

Heat oven to 350°F (180°C). Reserve 2 tbsp (30 mL) of the butter; set aside for filling. In large bowl, beat remaining butter and brown sugar until fluffy. Beat in eggs and vanilla until creamy. In a medium bowl, mix together flour, baking soda and oats. Mix into butter mixture. In large saucepan, mix reserved 2 tbsp (30 mL) butter, sweetened condensed milk, butterscotch chips and semi-sweet chocolate chips. Cook over low heat, stirring often until melted. Remove from heat. Stir in ¾ cup (175 mL) of the almonds. Spread 2/3 of oat mixture into parchment paper lined 9 x 13 inch (23 x 33 cm) pan. Spread chocolate mixture even over base. Crumble remaining oat mixture over filling. Sprinkle remaining ½ cup (125 mL) almonds on top. Bake 20 to 25 minutes, or until top is lightly brown. Let cool in pan on wire rack. Cut into squares.

Three 3 on a 6" disposable plate

**MOM'S CHOCOLATE/PEANUT COOKIES**

1 cup butter or margarine	1 tsp. cream of tartar	Mix all ingredients together, if a bit dry add a splash of milk. Drop by spoonful onto parchment covered cookie sheets. Bake at 350°F for 12 – 15 minutes.
1 cup brown sugar	1 tsp. baking soda	
1 egg	1 tsp. vanilla	
2 cups flour	1 cup Spanish peanuts with skins	
	1 cup chocolate chips	

15. **Butterscotch Shortbread Squares**

Three on a 6" disposable plate.

**Prizes** - 1st - \$10; 2nd - \$6; 3rd - \$4

**BUTTERSCOTCH SHORTBREAD SQUARES**

Crust: 1/4 cup brown sugar packed, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup flour

Filling: 1 egg well beaten 1 tbsp. flour  
1/2 tsp. baking powder 1/4 cup brown sugar  
1 cup chopped walnuts or almonds 1/2 cup desiccated coconut  
1 - 6oz. pkg. butterscotch chips

Preheat oven to 350°F. Mix the first three crust ingredients thoroughly and press firmly and evenly into an ungreased square 8" x 8" pan. Bake until golden brown, about 15-20 minutes. Mix all ingredients for filling. Spread on top of hot shortbread. Return to oven and bake until golden brown, about 20 minutes. When cool, cut into squares.

16. **CHEVIN ORCHARDS Special.**  
**APPLE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE**

(1 piece, 4" x 4" in a clear plastic bag or clear plastic wrap, on cardboard)

1/4 cup plus 3 tbsps butter; divided	3 apples	1 1/3 cups cake flour
1/2 cup brown sugar; packed	2 tsp lemon juice	3/4 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon		1 3/4 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. nutmeg		1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. mace		1/2 cup milk
		1 tsp. vanilla
		1 egg; separated

Preheat oven to 375°F. Melt 1/4 cup butter in 8 inch square baking pan. Add brown sugar and spices; mix well. Peel apples. Remove cores; discard. Cut apples into rings. Arrange over brown sugar mixture in bottom of pan; sprinkle with lemon juice. Set aside. Combine dry ingredients in large bowl. Cut in remaining 3 tablespoons butter with pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk and vanilla; beat at low speed with electric mixer until dry ingredients are moistened. Continue beating 2 minutes at medium speed. Blend in egg yolk. Beat egg white in small bowl at high speed with electric mixer until stiff peaks form; gently fold into batter. Pour over apples in pan. Bake 35 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack 5 minutes. Loosen edges and invert onto serving plate. Let stand 1 minute before removing pan.

Mix together: 1 1/2 cups flour; 1 tsp baking powder; 1 tsp baking soda; 1/4 tsp nutmeg; 1/2 tsp cinnamon; pinch of salt. Set aside. Beat until smooth: 1/2 cup brown sugar; 1/2 cup honey; 5/8 cup salad oil; 1 cup pumpkin; 2 eggs.

Add flour mixture all at once to pumpkin mixture and beat, then add 1/2 cup walnuts (chopped). Bake 1 hour at 325°F in loaf pan.

**Fibre-Power Biscotti** (recipe from Dieticians of Canada, 2007)

Three pieces on a disposable plate.

Recipe on next page.

**Fibre-Power Biscotti** (recipe from Dieticians of Canada, 2007)

2 cups (500 mL) bran cereal, crushed  
1 ½ cups (375 mL) all purpose flour  
1 cup (250 mL) granulated sugar  
¾ cup (175 mL) quick-cooking rolled oats  
½ cup (125 mL) sliced almonds  
½ cup (125 mL) finely chopped dried apricots  
2 tsp. (10 mL) baking powder  
3 eggs, lightly beaten  
1 tbsp. (15 mL) vegetable oil  
2 tsp. (10 mL) almond extract  
1 tsp. (5 mL) vanilla

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C). Line baking sheets with parchment paper or lightly grease baking sheets. In a large bowl, combine dry ingredients. In a small bowl, beat eggs, oil, almond extract and vanilla. Stir into bran cereal mixture until well blended (dough will be dry and crumbly). Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead 10 to 15 times, until dough holds together. Divide dough in half and shape each half into a log about 8" x 3" (20cm x 7.5 cm) wide. Place on baking sheets. Bake for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and reduce oven temperature to 325°F (160°C). Remove logs from baking sheets and let cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Using a serrated knife, cut each log into ½ inch (1 cm) thick slices. Return slices to baking sheets. Bake for 15 minutes. Turn biscotti over and bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until light brown. Let cool.

**CAKE DONUTS**

1/3 cup shortening	½ tsp. nutmeg
1/2 cup white sugar	1 ½ tsp. baking powder
1 egg	½ cup milk
1 ½ cups flour	½ tsp. salt

Mix together shortening, sugar and egg.

Mix together flour, baking powder, salt and nutmeg. Add flour mixture to shortening mixture with ½ cup milk.

Fill greased muffin tins 2/3 full. Bake at 375° for 20 - 25 minutes or until golden brown. When muffins are partially cooled, roll in melted butter (3/4 cup) and then roll in mixture of 3/4 cup sugar and 1 ½ tsp. cinnamon. Makes approximately 10 - 12 small cake donuts.

22. Collection of squares suitable for Afternoon Tea. (2 each of 3 varieties).

Three on a 6" disposable plate.

1/3 cup margarine	1 ½ cups flour
½ cup brown sugar	1 ½ tsp. baking soda
1 egg	pinch of salt
2 tbsp. molasses	1 tsp. cinnamon
Raisins	1 tsp. ginger

Blend together margarine and brown sugar. Stir in egg and molasses. Combine flour, baking soda salt, cinnamon and ginger. Stir the dry ingredients into the margarine. Form into balls. Flatten with a glass. Put three raisins on each cookie (two eyes and one mouth) Bake at 350°F for 8 minutes.

24. Butter Tarts, plain, no fruit or nuts, with homemade pastry. Three on a disposable plate.

### **Irish Soda Bread**

2 cups all purpose flour	Cut margarine into flour, sugar, baking soda, baking powder
3 tbsp. margarine or butter	and salt, until mixture resembles fine crumbs. Stir in
2 tbsp. sugar	buttermilk to make soft dough. Turn onto lightly floured
1 tsp. baking soda	surface, and knead 8 to 10 times. Shape into round loaf.
1 tsp. baking powder	Place on greased cookie sheet. Cut an X, about ¼ inch
½ tsp. salt	deep on top of loaf, with floured knife. Bake at 375° until
1 cup buttermilk	golden brown, 35 to 45 minutes.

### **Multigrain Buns**

1 pkg. Active dry yeast	3 tbsp butter or margarine; softened
3 cups warm water; 110-115 degrees	2 tbsp sugar
1 ½ cup whole wheat flour	1 ½ tsp salt
1 cup old fashioned oats	1 tsp caraway seed
1 egg plus 1 egg yolk	½ tsp vinegar
¼ cup sesame seeds	5 ½ cups all purpose flour
¼ cup salted sunflower seeds	2 tbsp water
¼ cup vegetable oil	Additional oats

In a bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add whole wheat flour, oats, 1 egg, sesame and sunflower seeds, oil, butter, sugar, salt, caraway, vinegar and 2 cups all-purpose flour; beat until smooth. Add enough remaining flour to form a soft dough. Turn onto a floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour. Punch dough down. Shape into round balls. Place on greased baking sheet. Beat egg yolk with water; brush over buns. Sprinkle with oats. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake at 350°F for 20 minutes or until golden brown.

## **COOKIES, SQUARES & SMALL CAKES**

(Three on 6" disposable plates **only**, in small plastic bags)

31. Three plain round tea biscuits with flaky layers  
Include on a small piece of note paper, a memory of making or eating tea biscuits from the past.  
Gift certificate for the Tea Biscuit Café and Studio for everyone who enters.
32. Three heirloom cookies - recipe below

### **Heirloom Cookies**

1 cup butter softened	1 ¼ cups almonds
1 cup icing sugar	(Finely ground)
1 tbsp. vanilla	2 cups flour
	½ tsp. salt

Cream butter and icing sugar in a medium mixing bowl. Blend in vanilla and almonds. In a separate bowl sift together flour and salt. Gradually stir dry mixture into butter/sugar mixture. Shape dough into balls the size of a teaspoon. Bake at 325°F on ungreased cookie sheet for 15-18 minutes. Take from oven and roll in a mixture of ½ cup icing sugar and 2 teaspoons of cinnamon.

### **Rolled Date Filled Cookies**

Date Filling: Combine in a saucepan, 2 cups finely chopped dates, ½ cup water and ½ tsp. white sugar.

Cook over medium heat until the dates are soft and the mixture is thickened. Stir constantly. Remove from heat. Let cool. Preheat oven to 350°F.

Cookie Dough: Blend together 1 cup flour, ¾ tsp. baking soda and ½ tsp salt. Add 1 cup brown sugar, 3 cups rolled oats and ½ cup melted margarine. Combine well. Sprinkle with ½ cup cold water. Add the water slowly mixing with a fork to make a soft but not sticky dough. Turn dough onto a lightly floured surface and roll very thin. Cut out with floured cookie cutter. Place the cookies on a greased baking sheet and bake in 350°F oven for 5 to 7 minutes. Cool cookies and then sandwich together with cooled date filling.

1 egg	1 tsp. cinnamon	Place on greased cookie sheets and bake at 375°F for

(in clear bags or clear plastic wrap, on cardboard)

- 43. **Blueberry Depression Cake** (1 piece, 4" x 4")

**BLUEBERRY DEPRESSION CAKE**

2 cups flour	1 ½ cups sugar
¾ cup shortening	2 eggs separated
1 cup milk	1 tsp. vanilla
1 pint fresh or frozen blueberries	

Blend flour, sugar and shortening with pastry cutter until it resembles a coarse meal. Remove one cup for topping and set aside. Add egg yolks, milk and vanilla to creamed mixture and blend until smooth. Beat egg whites until stiff, then fold gently into mixture. Pour into greased 9" x 13" pan. Place blueberries evenly on top of batter and top with remaining crumbs. Bake at 350°F for 40 minutes.

- 44. Applesauce Cake with raisins. Iced, not frosted. (removed from pan, display ½ cake only)
